Welcome to Your National Wilderness Preservation System!

Campfire & Stove Requirements

Check <https://www.fs.usda.gov/stanislaus> for current campfire and stove prohibitions. If you will enter other National Forest or Parks, check their websites as well.

Campfire use and stove use always require a permit and may be temporarily prohibited on all or part of the Stanislaus National Forest at anytime. Check the above website for current alerts & notices. This permits serves as a campfire & stove permit but only for the dates and only within wilderness areas submitted to the Stanislaus in the trip leader's wilderness permit. Except when and where restrictions apply, persons with a valid Campfire Permit may make a campfire, use certain stoves, and use certain lanterns. "Campfire" means a fire which is used for cooking, personal warmth, lighting, ceremonial, or aesthetic purposes, including fires contained within outdoor fireplaces, portable barbecue pits, space heating devices, and enclosed stoves. Stoves and lanterns must use jellied, liquid, solid, or gaseous fuels, must have a shut-off valve, and must be contained in an area at least five feet from any flammable materials, including needles and duff. You must personally supervise the campfire until it is completely extinguished, or ensure that another knowledgeable and responsible adult supervises the fire until you return. Extinguish the fire with water and a stirring tool using the "drown, stir, and feel" method. Please extinguish and report any abandon campfires.

Wilderness Regulations



Welcome to your National Wilderness Preservation System!
Enjoy your trip and help protect Wilderness, America's enduring resource

This permit is only valid for the wilderness areas, dates, and destinations listed on the reverse. Below are some of the common regulations on the nearby wilderness areas, but it is not a comprehensive list and regulations vary by area. It is your responsibility to learn and abide by all regulations that apply to the wilderness areas you visit.

Acts PROHIBITED within the Emigrant, Carson-Iceberg, and/or Mokelumne Wilderness

Permits & Groups

- Camping without a valid wilderness permit
- Entering or being in the Emigrant or Carson-Iceberg Wilderness as part of a group that is more than 15 persons.
- Entering or being in the Mokelumne Wilderness Area as part of a group that is more than 8 persons for overnight use or more than 12 for day use.

Camping

- Camping within 100 feet of any water source, designated trail, or posting in the above Wilderness Areas.
- Camping in the Emigrant for more than one night at Bear, Camp, Grouse, Powell, or Waterhouse Lakes. Camping in the Mokelumne Wilderness: a) Outside of a designated camping site in the Carson Pass Mgmt. Area (CPMA) from Memorial Day to Labor Day, b) Within 300 ft of Emigrant Lake, except when there is snow on the ground, c) Camping within 1/4 mile of Frog Lake, d) Within a designated camping site at Winnemucca or Round Top Lakes for more than two nights, e) Within a designated camping site at Fourth of July Lake for more than 3 nights.

Campfires & Stoves

- Leaving a fire without completely extinguishing it.
- Building, attending, maintaining, or using a campfire or a stove fire: a) without a valid campfire permit, b) without removing all flammable material (to bare mineral soil) from around the campfire adequate to prevent its escape, c) in a restricted area during fire restrictions, d) above 8,000 ft in the Mokelumne Wilderness, e) above 9000 ft or within 1/2 mile of Emigrant Lake in the Emigrant Wilderness, f) from the high-water line on the north shore of Salt Springs Reservoir up to 4,600 ft in elevation.

Firearms

- Discharging of firearms, rifles, or gas guns, except for the taking of wildlife as permitted by California State Laws.

Dogs

- Possessing a dog that is not under the immediate control of a responsible person or possessing a dog off leash in a restricted area.

Pack & Saddle Stock

- Riding or allowing a horse or other saddle or pack animal off National Forest System trails within the Round Top Special Interest Area.
- Possessing more than 12 head of saddle or pack stock per group in the Mokelumne Wilderness, or more than 25 head per group in the Emigrant or Carson-Iceberg Wilderness.
- Tying pack or saddle stock to trees, except while loading or unloading.
- Tying pack or saddle stock within 200 feet of lakes, streams, trails, or campsites, except while loading or unloading in the Mokelumne Wilderness, or within 100 feet of same within the Emigrant or Carson-Iceberg. Grazing or holding stock overnight within 1/4 mile of Bear, Camp, Deer, Grouse, Powell, Waterhouse, or Wood Lakes.
- Grazing or holding more than 4 head of stock overnight within 1/4 mile of Gem, Jewelry, Long, Maxwell, Pingree, Piute, and Rosasco Lakes

Resource Protection

- Possessing or using a motor vehicle or motorized equipment (including drones) except as authorized.
- Disposing any debris, garbage or other waste within the above wilderness areas.
- Disposing of body waste or wash water within 200 feet of any water source in the Mokelumne Wilderness, or within 100 feet in the Carson-Iceberg or Emigrant Wilderness.
- Shortcutting switchbacks on any designated trail.
- Leaving unattended equipment, personal property of supplies for more than 24 hours.
- Possessing or using any wagon, cart, or mechanical vehicle.

These regulations are in addition to the general regulations found in 36 CFR Part 261, Subpart A.
